November, 2017: Community Leader Christmas Greetings

This past June I had the opportunity to go to the L'Arche International Assembly in Belfast as the delegate for our community. Delegates, with and without disabilities from L'Arche communities around the world gathered at Queen's University in Belfast to celebrate, build relationships and do the work of the Federation-like vote for our new International Mandate and our International Leaders.

Before I went I didn't know much about Belfast or Northern Ireland and I felt privileged to learn more while I was there. Belfast is a beautiful and welcoming place but I learned that tensions can still simmer beneath the surface. In one of the workshops I attended led by one of the members of the Corrymeela community he talked of leading a workshop for people in "mixed marriages". I immediately thought that this was for people like me who are in interfaith and intercultural marriages – not so! In Northern Ireland mixed marriages are between a Catholic and a Protestant.

During the course of the Assembly I learned that Belfast isn't just about Belfast. The tensions that exist

in Belfast are connected to tensions I live in my own life. My choice is in how I respond. Will I choose to work for unity and peace or conflict and division? To be at the Assembly with people from L'Arche all over the world, to feel the reality that we are all united by the same Mission and a desire to work for peace and unity, touched me deeply.

I am grateful for the opportunity to experience the international reality of L'Arche and for all of the people who make our community life possible. For the Members whose daily commitment to life in the homes and community, for Board Members who carry the legal and financial responsibility and for our donors whose generous financial contributions keep our community afloat.

During this Christmas season I am especially thankful to all of our donors who so generously choose to support us with financial contributions.
