


Board President's Report ~ Spring, 2021

It has been an interesting year, to say the least, for the L'Arche Association of Lethbridge Board. Almost exactly one year ago, immediately following our successful Fundraising Dinner, we were scrambling to understand and to adjust to the rapidly changing and mostly unknown (and in many ways, unprecedented) realities of the latest strain of the coronavirus. The actual and potential medical, social, psychological, and financial implications of the pandemic for L'Arche Lethbridge, for us, were terrifying. One year later, however, the community has not only survived but, in many ways, thrived, I think, due to its excellent leadership team, due the hard work of all members of the community, and due to countless acts of vigilance and discipline, courage and strength, and especially generosity and kindness—in the L'Arche homes, in the relevant levels of Federal and Provincial government, and in the homes and workplaces of our donors and supporters.



There is still, to be sure, some distance yet to travel on this road: despite uncertainty about vaccinations, variant strains, and economic conditions here in Alberta, some optimism seems to be warranted. As vulnerable groups become vaccinated and as research and modified individual and social behaviour address epidemiological aspects of the virus, we still have a lot to learn about how it will shape our community in the future. Yet despite—and perhaps even in some ways because of—the limitations of the

pandemic, L'Arche Lethbridge has found all sorts of creative ways of dealing with the complex and, at times, discouraging, realities of social distancing and quarantine. Our latest Fundraiser, for instance, was "virtual": a cooking lesson and dinner that was as well-attended as it was enjoyable (and delicious!). Not only did we surpass our Fundraising goal for the year in a time of significant economic uncertainty, but we also forged an interesting new relationship with the community-minded folks at Umami Shop.

We remain, as a Board, grateful for the hard work, the vigilance, the creativity, and the kindness of countless people who have supported our community this past year: the pandemic, in some ways, has made the gifts of each member of L'Arche Lethbridge and those who support us not only more important than ever, but also more visible. Thanks especially to the volunteers on the Fundraising Committee and to Lew Dennis, who recently completed his term serving on the Board Executive. We look forward to

seeing everyone—face-to-face, we hope—at our next Fundraiser and, before that, at the various celebrations the 30th Anniversary Committee has planned for us this year! Until then, one hates to have to resort to cliché, of course, but I do think it is worth repeating: tough times, we are told, don't last, but tough—and let's add hard-working, talented, compassionate and creative—people and communities like L'Arche Lethbridge do.

Our Interconnected World

This past year has been one of newness, change, disruption, and invitation. It changed our daily life and challenged us to find new ways to connect and to bring our Mission to life. The pandemic continues to invite us to learn about how to build community, not just in the local sense of L'Arche members but a more just society between Albertans, Canadians, humans, and the biosphere that sustains us.

The Secretary-General of the United Nations, Antonio Guterres said in May 2020 that "In our interconnected world none of us is safe until we all are." This has always been true, but the pandemic has forced this reality into our collective consciousness. For me, an example of this is the high number of COVID infections and deaths of seniors in for-profit long-term care homes. This happened because of years of underfunding, lack of training for increasingly complex needs of seniors in long-term care, and an overall lack of compassion in our systems for people who are vulnerable and marginalized and those who care for them.

Nobel Laureate Joseph E. Stiglitz of Columbia University said that we should use this moment to "create a new world that, when we emerge from the pandemic, is a world that is more in accord with our views of what our society should be like [with] a greener economy, an economy marked by greater equality, social justice, racial justice, a

more knowledge-based economy."

In L'Arche, one of our founding principles is that each person is precious. We do our best to invite people who come to our community to open their hearts to those who are different and grow in the realization that we need each other. That the whole is more than the sum of its parts.

As we continue to live the challenges of this pandemic, I leave you with these words from Thomas Merton...

"It seems that we all have to face one sad thing after another. But let us not forget the home our faith gives us. God is our strength, and no amount of trouble should make us fail to realize it. On the contrary, trouble should help us deepen and confirm our trust. This is an old story, but as far as I am concerned, it is the one we always get back to. There is no other."

With his outgoing, joyous attitude, Brad inspires others to be resilient, even during the most difficult times. Brad, like many of us, has been affected by the pandemic and has been unable to visit his friends, family, and continue his volunteer work at the library. Fortunately, Brad's positive attitude allows him to view this from another angle, and the message he would like to spread to those who are in a similar situation is, "even if it is hard, make



new friends... they will show you what community means". New friends and community—both parts of the L'Arche experience.

Greeted with a warm welcoming hug from a core-member, Van began as a volunteer with the L'Arche community. Van's love for the community has only grown as she became more involved within the organization. She became an assistant, and is now the community life coordinator. The playful nature of many of the core-members, which include unanticipated humorous pranks, is well-loved by Van. These games always end in the same way they started—with jokes and laughter. Van also emphasized that it is the friendships and relationships that make L'Arche unique: "we're not just about paperwork, meetings, payroll and hiring—we know how to have fun and celebrate."
